1. Gary calls this little homemade creation his "Humming Bird". He designed this RC Rocket plane along the lines of a Thermic B. A C6-3 rocket engine is inserted into its hind quarters for oomph. Gary covered it with Microlite.





2. Mike has been keeping his PRUSA-I3 3D printer humming building this PT-17 Kaydet from 3D Lab-Print plans. He used PLA plastic for the majority of the build. His 47.9" wingspan plane weighs 5 1/2# and is powered with a Suppo 2826-? Motor.

JCSF Open House

On Saturday August 12th our club opened its doors to the public in celebration of AMA's annual **Model Aviation Day!** Despite less than optimum-looking weather conditions we had a fairly good turnout throughout the duration of the show, which ran from noon to 3pm. This year the AMA helped our club by giving us a grant to purchase supplies for the show, which we used for a number of purposes, including two new roadside banners, balloons, and snacks for our visitors. The banners were a big deal as in year's past many families said they couldn't find our field. Stu spoke with a number of visitors who said they didn't know about our event until they saw the signs outside the flying field!

Gary S. took the initiative to put together a demonstration agenda for the day, which worked out great. The agenda helped to keep planes in the air for the duration of the show. In addition Gary set aside themed flying times — WWI, WWII, flying wings, etc. and in between we had open flying. We also had Adam L. and visiting pilot Greg G. give individual airplane and helicopter demos respectively to the applause of the crowd.

In the end everyone in attendance had a great time. We had quite a few inquiries about our club and how to get involved, and hopefully we'll see some of these folks back at the field and potentially join us as members of the club!

Limbo!!!

On Sunday July 30th Adam L. CD'ed our now annual **Limbo** contest. Adam has made a number of changes over the years to the format of the contest to make this event more airplane friendly (i.e. not take out so many planes) and the results have definitely been positive. Doing something as simple as painting a centerline to guide the pilot to the center of the limbo has saved many a wing—this year alone we ended the contest with the same number of airplanes as we started— all without any damage!

This year we had ten pilots take up the Limbo challenge. Adam has modified the scoring so that all pilots fly the entire contest—you don't get eliminated if you happen to miss one of the limbo levels. You do get extra credit if you complete a level "quicker" - for example, a pilot gets three shots at the highest level. You will get more points if you get under the limbo successfully on your first try versus your second or third shot. And if you don't make the third shot you can still try flying in the next round, as scoring is cumulative.

One of the normal outputs of this contest is that we have a tie for first place, which again happened for four pilots. What this means is we have the "elimination round" - each pilot has two minutes to fly under the highest limbo position as many times as they can. It makes for a fun runoff, especially for the spectators!

In the end Adam, Bob K., Gary S. and Stan B. tied for first and entered the runoff. After the flying completed Adam snagged first place, with Stan taking second and Bob taking third. Gary unfortunately cut his ribbon and was eliminated from the fly-off. In the end everyone had a great time and again no planes were harmed during the contest (although my Taxi had a pretty cool carrier landing!)
