ture, so his passing really took me off guard. Bruce has been a part of the club before I joined back in the late 90s, and he was treasurer for many, many years. Bruce loved to fly float planes, and would drive on a regular basis to any float fly he could get to. However, one of my fondest memories of Bruce was flying off of the snow at Dorbrook. Bruce would take the wing off of his plane, and turn it into high-velocity snow speeder (just watch the turns!). He was a great guy, a fine pilot, and we're all really going to miss him...

If you've had a chance to come out to the field on a Saturday lately you might think you've taken a trip back to the 90's when you look at all the guys flying. It's been a LONG time since we've had so many pilots vying for a flight station, and it reminds me of the old days when we'd have 10+ frequency plaques lined up in front of the frequency box for guys waiting their turn to fly. Actually, with all of our new club members those memories may not be available, and maybe it's worth explaining why we did this. Back then we had a system set up so that if a pilot wanted to fly and all of the flight stations were taken that they'd put their frequency plaque in front of the flight box, and if someone was already waiting then you'd put your plaque behind theirs. On busy days we'd have a sizable line. With the advent of 2.4Ghz transmitters and less competition for flying stations we haven't had to do this of late, but with all of the pilots on a Saturday it's important that we make sure we rotate flying time. It's easy to get in a flight, fill up, and head right back to the flight line, but if there's a lot of guys be sure to ask if anyone else wants a turn. If everyone's good, then go for it, but be sure to check first.

Road Trip!!!

As most of you know, a large contingent of JCSF members makes the trip to NEAT Fair each September, and we set up a sizable presence there. For many years Mark Nettlingham brought all of the kitchen gear to the show, to the point that he couldn't bring anything else. We changed that last year, with everyone splitting up the gear, but that caused its own problems. Mike K. suggested that we investigate buying a trailer, and as it turns out one of our flying buddies was selling one—perfect size and a good price. The only rub was that it was up in Michigan.

While we originally thought we could arrange for an exchange in the middle, things conspired about against that plan, and a road trip was deemed the only way to go. Since Stu planned to tow the trailer to NEAT he also offered to take the ride to Michigan with me, so the trip was on! With the pandemic complicating things just a bit, we decided that a marathon drive would be the way to go. Thankfully our friend who sold us the trailer also offered to let us crash at his place so that we could get a few hours of sleep (he was away so he didn't have to worry about us sharing anything from NJ). So the trip was on!!!

On Friday July 31st we hit the road mid-morning, and quickly found ourselves in the midst of a 5+ hour trip though Pennsylvania. We took Route 80 all the way from Jersey, through PA and Ohio and up into Michigan. Between gas stop, bathroom breaks, and grabbing snacks the 700 mile trip to Michigan took about thirteen hours, rolling into Oxford around 11pm. We grabbed our sleeping bags, found some couches, and crashed for the night.

Next day I got up and swapped out the existing seven-pin connector on the trailer for a four-pin version that would work with both Stu's and my vehicle, hooked up, and hit the road! However, we first made a detour before getting back on the interstate. Most modelers recall Depron, and how it's no longer available in the states. A close replacement called Model Plane Foam (MPF) was introduced and works very well in place of Depron. The only problem with these materials is that they are expensive to ship, as you're essentially shipping a large box of air. However... the gentleman who sells MPF also lived only a few miles from where we picked up the trailer, so I made arrangements with him to buy some foam while we were out there. Since we had an empty trailer we had plenty of room for boxes. After picking up our foam and expressing our appreciation for meeting us on a Saturday we hit the road for home. The forecast called for nice weather on the way home, which turned out to be a joke as the rain started in Michigan and it poured through Ohio and most of PA. However we had a plan to get a break—stop by Bob Keibley's new house in the Poconos! It turns out that Bob's house is a few miles off of Route 80 so we stopped by for a bathroom break and dinner. Adam was also there for the weekend and they had pizza waiting for us so we got in some food and a lot of stretching. However we couldn't stay too long so soon we were back on the road for the final sprint home. We pulled up to my house at 12:30AM on Sunday so technically I guess this was a three-day trip but I'm still going with two - it was less than 48 hours so that seems fair. To say I slept well that night would be an understatement! But now we have a nice new (to us) trailer all ready for NEAT!!!
